# **Election of Parent Governors**

When a vacancy arises on the governing body for a parent representative, the school will inform all parents of the vacancy and will make the necessary arrangements for the subsequent election. Every parent of a registered pupil at the school will be entitled to stand as a candidate and to vote at the election, and will be given the opportunity to do so.

# **Financial Statement**

The LA provides the school with a budget for each financial year based upon a number of factors, including the number of children on the additional learning needs register, the school's floor space etc, but the main factor is the number of pupils on the school roll.

The money received from the LA is called the **Delegated School Budget**.

On receiving the delegated school budget, the Governors of the school decide how this money should be allocated and agree a budget which must then be approved by the local authority. This budget is continually monitored by the Senior Leadership Team and the Governing Body at their regular meetings. At these meetings any surplus or overspends are identified against a range of cost codes. This information is used to adjust the budget during the year to ensure spending follows the agreed plan.

The Headteacher, Administrative Officers & Chair of Governors also provide monthly financial reports to the LA who monitor and support the school with the use of the delegated budget.

# **Community Links**

Our annual services, such as Harvest, Remembrance and Christmas continue to strengthen our links with the local British Legion, the local Church, and help us to support our community's elderly.

Ysgol Maesydderwen pupils are encouraged to become global citizens as well as local citizens. This has continued in lessons through a wide variety of activities. In addition, the learners and staff at the school continue to support local charities and good causes. This includes the vast amounts of donations of food to the local foodbanks, donations of Christmas Hampers, the holding of a Christmas Fayre for our most vulnerable families. Finally, the school continues to raise money for our nominated charities through a number of events such as the end of year Race of Life.

Our learners have represented our local community on a national stage. One of our learners, Tilly Jones, has continued her role as a member of the Welsh Government Youth Parliament.

The school has developed a partnership with the Ospreys Rugby club through the Tackle Project. In addition, the school has continued to develop links with the community which have a direct positive impact on learners' work. This includes the support of local businesses in the GCSE Welsh Baccalaureate presentations and the fieldwork of important historical areas of Ystradgynlais as part of the Year 7 & 8 Skills Days.

We continue to have very good working relationships with the local social services, the Youth Service and Police to help us provide care, support and guidance for all pupils including the most vulnerable.

The school continued to work closely with the cluster primary schools. As well as the usual excellent support for learners in year 6 with their transition into year 7 the cluster have set up a number of curriculum groups to develop strategies and resources with the implementation of the Curriculum for Wales. This work will have sustainable benefits for learners in the future.

# Music and Performing Arts

The Music department had a very busy 2022-23 which culminated with a very pleasing set of Performing Arts results at the end of Year 11. The learners achieved a 33% pass rate for A\*/A and a 100% pass rate A\*-C and A\*-G.

Learners contributed to a number of whole school 'live' events through a variety of musical performances. This included amongst others the Harvest Assembly, Remembrance Service and the Presentation Assembly at the end of the year. In addition, the Music staff worked closely with teachers from English, Welsh and Drama to successfully perform the first in-person Christmas Concert since 2019.

The department has supported a number of learners to continue to develop skills and experience success in a number of areas. This includes learners successfully auditioning for a number of external shows and performances.

The school worked closely with the local authority to further develop the offer of peripatetic lessons that are available for our learners. This has ensured that more learners are receiving music tuition to support their development of musical skills throughout the year.

# <u>Sport</u>

Not only can students participate in sporting activities during PE lessons, we also offer a wide range of extra-curricular sporting activities. The clubs run during lunchtimes as well as after school allowing many more learners to participate. Examples of lunchtime clubs include, gymnastics, dance, girls football and basketball.

The Physical Education curriculum aims to enable students to become independent, capable and ambitious learners who enjoy physical activity and make significant progress towards achieving their full potential. Through a diverse program of activities, students have the opportunity to discover their personal aptitudes while developing their communication and leadership skills along with concepts of fairness and social responsibility.

Our aim is to equip our students with the skills, knowledge and confidence required to enable them to participate fully in a healthy and active lifestyle.

The GCSE PE results in 2023 were outstanding with 67% of learners achieving an A\* or A grade, 92% of learners achieving an A\*-C grade and 100% of learners achieving an A\*-G grade.

There have been a number of exceptional performances by learners this year. The school appointed a WRU Rugby officer and teams have developed and grown. This includes the establishment of girls' teams in rugby and football. Learners at Ysgol Maesydderwen have continued to experience success at regional, national and international level. A list of some of notable achievements are:

- Rugby Year 8 reached the semi-finals of the Powys County 10 a-side competition
- Gymnastics Macie Maggs represented her club at an international Gymnastics competition in Florida
- High Jump Jayden Alkins represented Wales in the British National Championships achieving a personal best of 1.80m
- Football Myah Davies was selected to represent Wales in the Under 14s squad
- Cheerleading Isabel Grimes won a Bronze medal as part of the Wales Cheerleading team at the World Championships
- Equestrian Sienna Norton represented Wales and came 3<sup>rd</sup> in the Mounted Games at

the Royal Windsor Horse Show

- Rugby Swansea Valley Under 15s won the National Schoolboys final with good representation from Ysgol Maesydderwen
- Football Jacob Penhale was an instrumental member of Briton Ferry Under 16s team that won FA Wales Academy National Championships

# The Curriculum

#### Key Stage 3

During the first three years at Ysgol Maesydderwen the school offers a curriculum based on the National Curriculum. Our Year 7 & 8 curriculum is based on Areas of Learning and Experience (AoLEs), in line with the curriculum for Wales.

In **Years 7 and 8** subjects are taught in mixed ability groups and in **Year 9** most subjects are usually taught in ability groups based around English and Mathematics sets. In every year support is provided for those with additional learning needs.

In all years where the numbers are too high, for health and safety reasons, Design Technology and Physical Education the form group may be split into smaller classes.

#### Key Stage 4

In Years 10 and 11 all pupils follow a core curriculum of English, Mathematics, Science, Welsh, Religious Education, Welsh Baccalaureate Skills Challenge, Careers / PSE, and statutory Physical Education. The first six subjects listed are taken to examination level. All pupils in accordance with the 14-19 Learning Pathway chose 3 other subjects from a comprehensive range of subjects.

#### Key Stage 5

Students in Year 12 and 13 are offered a wide range of Advanced Supplementary within the Welsh Baccalaureate qualification and Advanced A2+ subjects. This offer is via a mixture of face to face learning at the school and on-line lessons in collaboration with other Powys secondary schools.

Students are expected to follow a minimum of 3 AS subjects including the Welsh Baccalaureate (Skills Challenge). Learners are expected to pursue 3 subjects to Advanced level.

# Healthy Eating and Drinking

At Ysgol Maesydderwen we encourage pupils to make healthy choices and be active members of our school community.

Awareness of the need to adopt healthy eating and drinking is delivered through the PSE curriculum including assemblies and other areas such as food technology and science.

A strong emphasis is placed on the importance of a healthy diet for life and how such a lifestyle will benefit their emotional wellbeing as well as physical health. The school canteen works within the statutory nutrition requirements for schools.

The school has a number of water fountains and pupils are encouraged to drink water throughout the day including during lessons.

#### Welsh Language – Welsh Language Category 1 – English Medium

The primary language of work and instruction throughout the school is English. However, we are proud of our Welsh culture and seek to recognise this in as many ways as possible, including during assemblies and the St. David's Day Concert. We promote the use of conversational Welsh in all lessons and the daily life of the school.

To further develop the use of Welsh it is used across the curriculum for dates, headings and praise. Welsh is also used to welcome pupils to classes and assemblies and as pupils enter the school at the start of the day. In lessons incidental Welsh may be used by teachers and learners as part of daily routines. During 2022-23 the school achieved the Bronze Siarter laith Award and is now working towards gaining the Silver Award.

## Additional Learning Needs (ALN)

ALN provision at Ysgol Maesydderwen is successful and effective, ensuring that all pupils with learning difficulties have access to the National Curriculum.

All pupils placed on the Code of Practice have an Individual Education Plan (IEP), which is regularly reviewed and discussed by subject staff.

Annual reviews are attended by ALN staff, parents, students and representatives of other agencies.

Between September 2022 and July 2023 there were 175 learners on the ALN register.

There were:

- •7 learners with a statement
- •2 learners with a LA IDP
- •61 learners on School Action+
- •15 learners with a School IDP
- •90 learners on School Action

During the year the school has continued the process of moving the identification of ALN learners to the new definitions defined in the new ALN Code.

Students with specific learning difficulties follow a general multi-sensory programme as appropriate, either in one to one or small group withdrawal situations. There are three Learning Support Assistants (LSAs) who support ALN students in departments and in main

stream classes. They ensure that all students are fully motivated and encouraged to make progress in all areas of the curriculum.

Our Specialist Learning Centre is now well established, and caters for pupils with a greater level of need. These pupils have both a full-time teacher and a LSAs who cater further for their individual needs. These pupils are taught in the centres and in main-stream classes where appropriate.

During 2022-23 the school opened up a Nurture Centre to provide a medium term focused intervention strategies to support learners who have attachment related social, behavioural, emotional and wellbeing needs which could otherwise become long-term barriers to learning and attainment.

Disabled students are welcome at Ysgol Maesydderwen. They are fully included in all aspects of school life and all efforts are made to ensure that they have access to the National Curriculum.

The school's Disability Accessibility Plan and Strategic Equality Plan aim to promote inclusion and equality of opportunity. Copies of this are available on the school's website.

# **Toilet Facilities**

Toilets are available for students on the ground floor and first floor. The school's toilets are organised into separate boys' and girls' toilets with separate disabled toilets for pupils to use. The school's toilet facilities are excellent and are cleaned throughout the day. In addition, students are encouraged to report any matters as required.

#### **School Premises**

We have an ongoing programme of maintenance to ensure the school continues to provide an attractive and safe learning environment.

We have continued a very good working relationship with staff at Ystradgynlais Leisure Centre. This ensures that we maximise use of the excellent facilities whilst ensuring we continue to safeguard our learners.

#### School Improvement Plan

Each year the staff and governors work on a School Improvement Plan (SIP), which leads school improvement for the coming year. The five proirties that the school have identified for improvement are as follows:

- 1) Improve the progress of learners supported by a range of knowledge, skills and experience
- 2) Reduce the impact of poverty on learners progress and skills
- 3) Continue to develop a culture of personal improvement for all stakeholders throughout the school
- 4) Improve the progress, skills and experiences of learners through the successful implementation of a range of curriculums
- 5) Improve all aspects of the school through the continued improvement of Leadership at all levels
